



MASONIC SYMBOLISM

There are many, many symbols in Freemasonry and most of them seem to have multiple meanings. In reality, their base representation does not change but, as Brothers proceed through the degrees, the deeper substance of the symbols are more fully revealed and the complexity of any single symbol becomes clearer even as its interrelation with other symbols becomes more apparent. This article touches on only a few of the symbols that are commonly displayed in a Freemason Lodge.

- Square & Compasses: This is the universal symbol of Freemasonry. When placed together with God (the letter G), represent peace and harmony. When a Lodge is opened, the mind and heart of each member should also be opened to the meaning of the Great Symbol, that Light and Truth may become the supreme reality in our lives.
 - The Square is an emblem of virtue and a symbol of morality. It is the official emblem of the Lodge/Master. It teaches morality, truthfulness, and honesty.
 - The Compasses represent boundaries and exemplify wisdom and conduct. They are the measure of a Freemason's life and conduct. They represent the spirituality (soul) of a man. Between the extended points of the compasses are the principal tenets of Freemasonry; friendship, morality, and brotherly love.
 - The letter **G**: The 'G' represents the Great Architect of the Universe (Grand Geometrician, God). It also represents Geometry, the mathematical science employed by operative Masons.
- White Apron (white leather or lambskin): It represents the purity of life (innocence) and rectitude (rightness) of conduct. It is the badge of a Mason. It should be worn with dignity and honor. All that Freemasonry teaches is exemplified by the wearer of this apron. A Mason carries this Light with him into the next existence.
- Anchor and Ark: Together, they represent a life will-lived. The anchor is symbolic of hope, patience, immortality, and safe rest in eternal tranquility. The ark is symbolic of the journey through the rough seas of life.

- Masonic Wages: Corn, Wine, and Oil: Operative Fellowcrafts received these as payment for their labor. Today, Freemasons earn these wages through acts of kindness and their gift of time to others. To receive the 'wages', a Brother must labor.
 - Corn is an emblem of nourishment (nourish the needy),
 - wine is one of refreshment (refresh the destitute), and
 - oil is of emblematic of joy and happiness (pour the oil of joy into the hearts of the afflicted).
- Beehive: This is an emblem of industry (industry being the employment of a very large number of men). Working in harmony with others enables a Mason to receive wages "to support himself and family...".
- Cable-Tow: This is a symbol of the cord or bond of love, which should unite the whole fraternity. It is emblematic of a brother's ability and commitment to participate in Lodge activities. It also reminds the initiates to accept the guidance of those brothers he knows to be enlightened. Finally, it reinforces the symbolic, rather than physical, bond of the brother to the fraternity when it is removed.
- Masonic Altar: It is a symbol of our place of communion with the Great Architect of the Universe. It is the center of the Lodge-room. It is the proper place for the Volume of Sacred Law upon which all masons take their obligations.
- Mosaic pavement: One of the ornaments of a Lodge. This floor pattern is symbolic of human life, checkered with good and evil, duality and balance. With the blazing star in its center and the indented tessel surrounding it, it represents the ground floor of King Solomon's Temple, the blueprint of Freemason Lodges.








Please RSVP if you are coming to the dinner, so that we may be prepared with enough steaks.


